Dentistry" and "Nobody Caries". This is an excellent course for the whole team!





PA Coalition for Oral Health: A Resource for Dental Providers

Background

PA Coalition for Oral Health (PCOH) serves as the dynamic leading voice to improve oral health across the commonwealth. We believe optimal oral health benefits ALL Pennsylvanians and that it is essential to overall health and wellness. By bringing together oral health advocates and professionals to share the best and most innovative approaches, we have identified strategic priorities to accomplish our collective vision. PCOH is the statewide advocacy organization promoting dedicated to importance of lifelong dental health by shaping policy and educating the public, so Pennsylvanians know that all mouths matter.

2024 PrioritiesSupporting PA oral workforce development

PCOH works closely with the three major dental schools in PA to address workforce pipeline **PCOH** concerns. has been working with partners to promote all dental careers to high school students and students enrolled in career and technical programs. PCOH has also been working on building relationships with community health workers and medical providers to ensure oral health education reaches as many Pennsylvanians as possible.

Improving oral health for Pennsylvania's most vulnerable populations

Founded in the belief that oral health is essential to overall health and wellness, every Pennsylvanian should have equal access to care. The unfortunate reality is that our most vulnerable populations struggle to get the care they need. These vulnerable populations include children, older adults, individuals with disabilities, individuals in rural areas, those living in poverty, and many more. A large portion of these individuals qualify for state-funded medical assistance coverage.

Advancing and advocating for oral health policy and infrastructure across all systems

PCOH works closely with the Pennsylvania Department of Health's Oral Health Program to administer the Pennsylvania Oral Health Plan 2020-2030. This document provides the blueprint of how efforts, resources, and interests can be combined to strengthen the collective capacity to ultimately prevent oral disease and assist individuals in achieving a lifetime of good oral health and general health.

In 2011, comprehensive dental benefits for the adult medical assistance population were drastically cut. As a result, treatment options afforded those with commercial dental insurance or the ability to pay have been out of reach to hundreds of of Pennsylvanians. thousands Those adults enrolled in Medicaid can only receive basic restorations, preventive services, one set of dentures/partials, and extractions. Crowns, periodontal treatment, and root canals are not covered services, unless the patient qualifies for a complicated benefit limit exception.

In partnership with the Pennsylvania Dental Association and other oral health advocates, PCOH was able to make an impact on legislation in 2023. Legislation to restore the adult dental benefit in Medicaid and legislation to codify teledentistry both passed the House of Representatives during the last month of 2023. PCOH has been a resource to legislators and will continue to help push both pieces of legislation across the finish line.

Advocating for community water fluoridation

Historically, talk of adjusting the fluoride levels in community water supplies has met its fair share of disagreements among all populations. From the oral health perspective, we know that community water fluoridation programs are safe and effective in

consistently providing optimally fluoridated water to the most people. To promote the benefits of water fluoridation, PCOH gathered and trained a team of advocates who can share knowledge in public meetings and local fluoride task forces. These individuals are deployed into communities to deliver science-based information and resources with stakeholders and decision-makers. This advocacy team also actively monitors and counters anti-fluoridation efforts across the state. On May 1, 2024, PCOH will partner with Penn Dental to hold a 70th anniversary celebration of water fluoridation in Philadelphia.

PCOH has shifted focus on developing sound relationships with local water authorities and the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) by continued outreach efforts and attending statewide water operator conferences. Currently, municipalities are legally required to publish alerts related to fluoridation status adjustments just 30 days prior to filing their permit to change. PCOH is working with

the state dental director, Dr. Jonise McDaniel, to extend and change the notice requirement to prior to any vote or decision being made. This additional time will allow adequate time to defend community water fluoridation programs by educating stakeholders on the research-proven value it delivers to citizens.

Request Materials Page

Looking for educational oral health resources for your office or community? PCOH has dozens of resources available through the Request Materials page at www. paoralhealth.org. All materials are available to download for free but can also be shipped directly to advocates and offices. Resources include flyers, postcards, posters, and magnets covering topics on systemic health, careers in oral health, children's oral health, tobacco and nicotine cessation, community water fluoridation, and HPV prevention. CE Course Portal

PCOH houses a course portal

with eight free online courses for dental providers, community health workers, and dental and dental hygiene students. Six of these courses offer free continuing education credits for PA dental providers. These courses include topics covering increasing acceptance of HPV parental vaccination, building inclusive dental practices for patients with disabilities, integrating nicotine dependence treatment with oral health, promotion of age one dental visits, and more. At least two more courses will be added to the course portal in early 2024.

AM: OFFENSIVE DENTISTRY

Let's face it, sitting through a lecture about dental caries or caries risk assessment isn't appealing (in fact it sounds downright boring). However, the science of clinical cariology is beginning to have an impact on restorative techniques and technology. Streptococcus mutans has more to fear than a rheostat, now that we're armed with salivary diagnostics and bioactive materials. At the end of this course, participants should be able to:

PM: NOBODY CARIES

Other times our patients with impeccable hygiene develop rampant decay and we feel helpless because we can't figure out what's going on. The mouth is a remarkable environment that cariologists are finally beginning to understand, and so can you. DATA BREACHES CAN HAPPEN TO ANY PERSON, OR BUSINESS

Cybersecurity expert offers best protection practices.

Gary Salman, CEO and co-founder of Black Talon Security, has a warning for dental workplaces.

"Many practices still harbor a broken mindset, meaning they believe they are immune to breaches, thinking that it won't happen to them," he said.

Mr. Salman's New York-based cybersecurity firm has experience helping dental practices be mindful of expanding threats. In 2019, he helped some of the practices affected by a ransomware attack that impacted about 100 dental practices, leaving them without access to their patient records, schedules and more. Mr. Salman also lectures across the country, providing tips on how to avoid data breaches. He answered questions from the *ADA News* on what causes data breaches and how it relates to practitioners.

ADA News: What are typical causes of data breaches?

Mr. Salman: There are two primary causes of data breaches. The first attack methodology utilizes social engineering scams, such as phishing, spear phishing, SMSishing [done via text or instant messaging apps] and Vishing [using phone calls and voicemail]. These attacks typically result in users surrendering their credentials, such as usernames and passwords, or downloading malicious payloads that deploy ransomware and steal patient data. The second attack methodology involves detecting and exploiting vulnerabilities in devices such as firewalls, servers, workstations and smart devices. Hackers scan these devices without the practice's permission, identify flaws in software and hardware and use tools to gain access to the device and its data. Once they have infiltrated the network, they spend days or weeks exfiltrating most or all of the patient data and gain access to other systems that the practice uses.

ADA News: Are there obvious signs that a cybersecurity incident has occurred? What should dentists be on the lookout for?

Mr. Salman: Arriving at their office on a Monday morning, employees may find that computers either won't turn on, display a skull and crossbones on the monitor or see a ransom note indicating a ransomware attack. Other signs include servers being down, workstations malfunctioning, encrypted files on the desktop, inability to open files and the possibility of receiving phone calls from the hackers.

ADA News: What are practical ways that dental offices can prevent data breaches from happening?

Mr. Salman: In addition to collaborating with their IT resources, practices should engage a dedicated cybersecurity company that works hand in hand with IT to ensure adherence to all best practices. It's also crucial that all doctors and staff complete cybersecurity awareness training, a key component of compliance with the Health Insurance Portability and

Accountability Act, and undergo a security risk assessment to determine if changes are needed in their current data security policies and procedures. Real-time vulnerability scanning of computers to detect hardware and software vulnerabilities is essential. Daily scanning of firewalls to identify vulnerabilities, misconfigurations or open ports is necessary. Employing an ethical hacker to test the configuration and resilience of the firewall and using AI-based antivirus software to reduce ransomware risks are important steps. Maintaining clear visibility into all devices that pose a risk to the practice enables doctors to make informed, risk-based decisions. Implementing multi-factor authentication on banking, human resource systems, finance and electronic health record systems, using a domain-specific email address instead of a free Gmail or AOL account and deploying artificial intelligence-based email security tools to preemptively detect malicious emails are critical measures.

ADA News: In the last few years, are hackers getting more sophisticated in their methods?

Mr. Salman: Very much so. We have observed a significant increase in payroll fraud, wire fraud, email compromise and third-party breaches that subsequently impact the practice, patient care and reputation, among other issues. Criminals are leveraging AI-based technology to create malicious code, a technique that no longer necessitates advanced coding skills from hackers. They are also utilizing technologies such as ChatGPT to craft highly convincing spear phishing emails. An example [might include] a fake referral letter that directs the recipient to a malicious link under the guise of downloading X-rays.

ADA News: What should dentists do if they fear that a data breach has happened?

Mr. Salman: Immediately disconnect the network from the Internet to sever the hackers' access. Encourage anyone who witnessed anything unusual or possesses relevant information to create a timeline and document their observations. This documentation may include screenshots of ransom notes and detailed accounts of events as they recall them. Contact the cyber insurance provider without delay. Do not erase or delete any data on the system. Maintain confidentiality about the incident to prevent public knowledge of the potential cyber event. Engage a cybersecurity firm to conduct forensic analysis and assist with network recovery. Inadequate management of a cyber event can lead to severe legal and compliance repercussions. It is important to note that most IT companies prioritize restoring operations and may not fully grasp the legal implications of the breach.


